Baby Animals Fact File

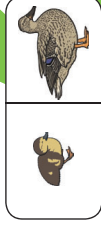
In spring, lots of animals give birth to baby animals. Spring time is a busy time on the farm! Baby animals have their own special names.



- A baby chicken is called a chick.



- A baby cow is called a calf.



- A baby duck is called a duckling.



- A baby goat is called a kid.



- A baby goose is called a gosling.



- A baby horse is called a foal.



- A baby pig is called a piglet.



- A baby sheep is called a lamb.
