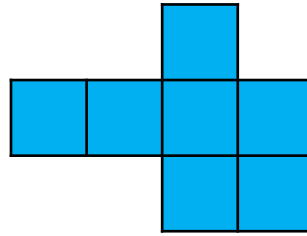
Compare Volume

1. Three children create a shape using cm cubes. This is what all three of their shapes look like from the top.



Teagan

My shape has a volume of 30cm^3 .



Rima

My shape has a smaller volume than Teagan's shape.

You're all correct!



Josh

My shape has a greater volume than Teagan's shape.

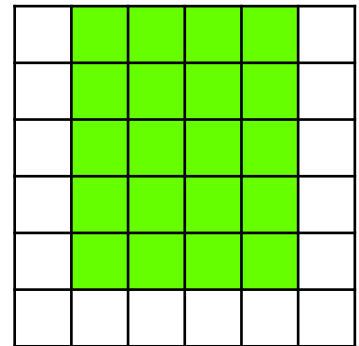
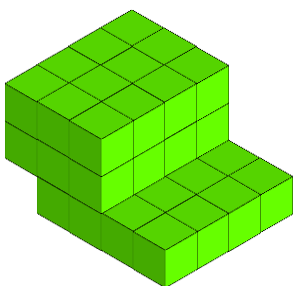
Explore how this is possible if all their shapes look the same from the top.

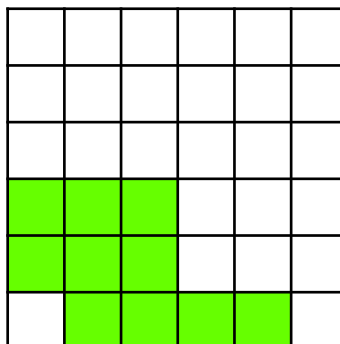
2. Here is a shape made out of 1cm cubes shown in different views.

Will the number of cubes be greater or smaller than the starting number?

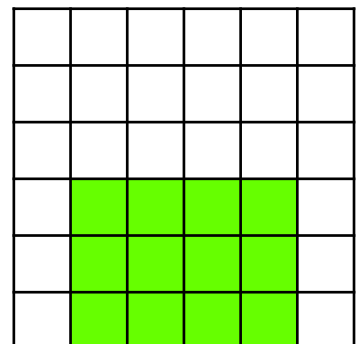

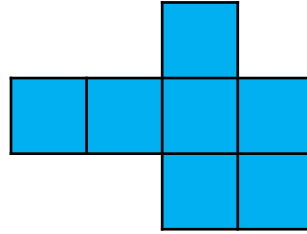

2. Here is a shape made out of 1cm cubes shown in different views.

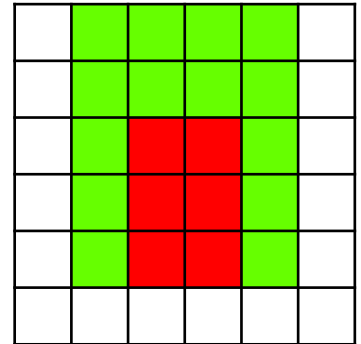
Edit the shape so that it has a volume greater than 30cm^3 but less than 60cm^3 .

Will the number of cubes be greater or smaller than the starting number?

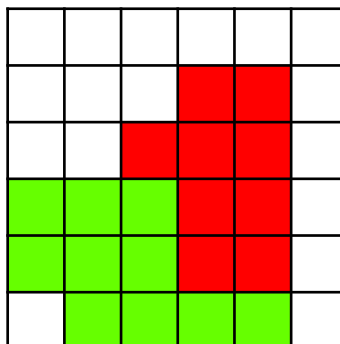
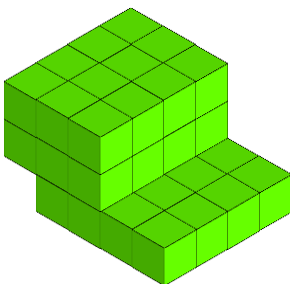
Explore different possible solutions.

Various answers, for example:

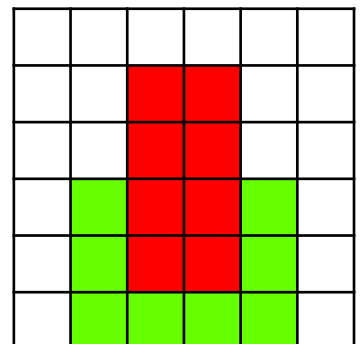
You could add more cubes in the positions shown to give the shape a greater volume. It's new volume would be 58cm^3 .
